## WEEKLY NUMERACY PROBLEM



#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Questions and previous week's solution will be shared on a Monday.

Solutions should be placed in the box by the main reception with students name and tutor group clearly written.

Correct solutions will be awarded points.

A certain digital lock has a keypad with five buttons labelled 1 to 5. To activate the locking mechanism, a secret code is set with these restrictions: the code must contain three parts, each part will consist of either pressing one button or pressing two buttons simultaneously, and no button may be pressed more than once. For example [3][4][1], [1][2 & 4][5] and [1 & 2][4][3 & 5] are three possible codes. Also, note that [1] [2 & 4][5] and [1][4 & 2][5] are indistinguishable. How many distinct secret codes can be set for this lock?



## LAST WEEK'S NUMERACY SOLUTION

After the first trolley, each new trolley just makes a 'gap':



10 trolleys = 1 trolley + 9 gaps = 2.9 m 20 trolleys = 2.9 m + 10 gaps = 4.9 m

 $\therefore$  10 gaps = 2 m  $\Rightarrow$  1 gap = 20 cm

1 trolley +  $9 \times 20$  cm = 2.9 m  $\therefore$  1 trolley is 1.1 m long.

#### **Free School Meals**



Your child, or children, may qualify for Free School Meals if you meet the following criteria:

You or your partner have a child for whom you receive Child Benefit and who is attending a school or college in Telford and Wrekin and you get any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income gross income of no more than £16,190)
  - support under Part VI of the Immigration & Asylum Act 1999
- Pension Credit (guaranteed credit)
- Universal Credit and your household income is less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get).

A healthy well balanced lunchtime meal.



## LETTER FOR ATTENTION OF ALL STUDENTS CYCLING TO SCHOOL

#### October 2019

Dear Parent / Carer,

As the poor weather and reduction in daylight hours continues to draw in, it is important that those pupils who cycle to school, and leave their bicycles on school grounds during the day, are doing so in a safe and legal manner. Holy Trinity Academy strongly advocates this mode of transport for its pupils as it is not only a form of healthy exercise but also environmentally friendly.

However, over the past 12 months there have been a number of incidents involving pupils from our school and we would like reduce this to zero.

Legal Reminder	Advisory
Bicycles must be in a 'roadworthy' condition	Have lights and reflectors fitted even if the bicycle is only used during official daylight hours – still may be needed when visibility is poor
Must have 2 independent and efficient braking systems – front and rear	Pupils not to listen to music whilst cycling
Front and rear lights – these must be lit, clean and working properly prior to sunrise and after sunset official timings and not according to one's own judgement of the sunlight	Have a bell fitted
Head torches are allowed as an additional form of lighting but not as a replacement of a cycle light	Wear a cycle helmet
Reflectors – there must be 4 x amber reflectors on the pedals and a red reflector on rear of bike prior to sunrise and after sunset official timings and not according to one's own judgement of the sunlight	Wear reflective clothing
Pupils are not allowed to cycle on the designated pedestri- an paths - if there are 'bike paths' then this will be indicat- ed with the appropriate signage	
When cycling on the road, pupils must obey the Highway Code to avoid 'careless cycling'	

Whilst we understand that cycling on the roads is hazardous and that some pupils prefer to use designated pedestrian paths, this is illegal. If pupils still decide to use designated pedestrian paths then they will have to take additional care not to injure any pedestrians. On arriving at Holy Trinity Academy, all cyclists must dismount from their bicycles and walk them to the bike storage area.

It is important that bicycles are kept in a roadworthy condition in order for the cyclist to be safe. This is the responsibility of the parent / carer and the pupil.

We wish each Holy Trinity Academy cyclist a safe journey.

Please do not use systems such as Show My Homework to communicate with staff.

Whatever the form of communication, please provide brief details of the nature of the concern.

The school operates a "Zero Tolerance Policy". Whilst we appreciate that parents may be contacting the school regarding a disagreement, it is essential that the matter is dealt with in a professional manner in order to ensure the best outcome for our students. Abuse and rudeness towards staff will not be tolerated.

Please understand that teachers will need <u>up to 4 working days</u> to respond to communication requests, as schedules are very busy at school and the answer may involve meeting with other teachers who may have valuable input. More complicated issues may take longer to fully and effectively resolve.

Please do not attend school without having previously made an appointment as this can be very difficult to accommodate due to teaching schedules and other meetings before/after school. You can arrange for an appointment via the main school office.

Reception staff will ask for brief details of the nature of the communication in order to direct you to the most appropriate person.

Any major behavioural concerns or urgent safeguarding issues should be dealt with via a phone call to the main office to ensure a quick and positive outcome if required. Urgent safeguarding concerns can be reported to Family Connect on 01952 385385. The Pastoral Team will endeavour to deal with urgent issues as quickly as possible, within 48 hours. #### A life-long adventure...
