INTRODUCTION:

Do you have a love of literature and a passion for exploring what messages writers express through poetry, plays and novels? If so... A Level English Literature could be the right course for you.

We would like you to have a passion for Literature, reading widely and expressing your own opinions on characters, themes and messages in a range of texts.

In this course, you will have an opportunity to discover a range of different literary movements and critical theories. These will enrich your understanding of English Literature and – by extension- the wider world.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS/ SUITABILITY:

Students are required to have achieved a Grade 6 in both GCSE English Literature and GCSE English Language.

Candidates who study this course must have a love of reading and other story telling methods (i.e. poetry, plays, film, TV). This course requires you to construct strong critical arguments and have a wide knowledge of writers. Independent learning and the ability to research is therefore an essential skill.

CONTENT:

Year 12:

Component 1 and 2: Candidates will study one of their set plays (A Doll's House) and a Shakespeare play (Hamlet).

Component 2: Candidates will study a set novel (1984).

Coursework: Candidates will complete a close analysis of an extract from an extra text studied.

Candidates will write a critical comparison of an extra two texts studied.

Year 13:

Component 1: Drama and Poetry- Candidates will study a collection of poetry from the same poet, and revise Hamlet.

Component 2: Comparative and contextual study Candidates will study one of their novels (Fahrenheit 451) and revise 1984.

LEADS TO:

Studying English Literature means you can go on to pursue careers in a diverse range of roles and sectors. Often English graduates will choose to utilise their strong communication skills, as long with their detailed knowledge of the written word. Popular career options include journalism, marketing, advertising and jobs within the media industry.

English Literature is a well-recognised academic subject. It therefore supports students looking at studying subjects such as law, history or politics at university.
